What is Psychology

- According to Crow and Crow, Psychology is the study of human behaviour and human relationship.
- JB Watson (1912) defined Psychology as the science of behaviour.
- Pavlov described it as the science of behaviour and the experiences of human beings.





Why Study Psychology at Archbishop Tenison's School?

At Tenison's we study the AQA course and offer both AS and A Level Psychology.

The AQA specification is designed to be an engaging and effective introduction to Psychology for students.

The course allows you to explore the human mind and behaviour and investigate questions such as:

- Why did the atrocities in the holocaust happen?
- How important is our relationship with our parents?
- Why might a child be aggressive?
- You will also learn about mental health disorders such as addiction and schizophrenia.

Paper 2: Psychology in Context






Student Expectations
