What is Pupil Premium?

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) funding is provided by the Education Funding Agency (EFA) in addition to the school's core funding. The funding is used to support the progress and outcomes of the following groups of pupils in Years 7-11 who are identified as at risk of underachieving:

- Pupils who are currently eligible for Free School Meals
- Pupils who have been eligible for Free School Meals within the last six years
- Pupils who are currently, or have ever been, looked after or in care
- Pupils from a Forces background

Vision

At Archbishop Tenison's we support and challenge all our pupils to aim high and achieve well, regardless of their background. We use Pupil Premium funding to support our eligible pupils in making this a reality, with a focus on three key areas:

- A. High quality teaching.
- B. Academic support in core subjects at Key Stage 3 and 4.
- C. Wider strategies to enable pupils to access the full curriculum.
- D. Targeted individual support according to need.

The rationale for these priorities is based on research from several sources which identify the most effective strategies in supporting pupils eligible for Pupil Premium funding. These include *The Education Endowment Foundation Guide to the Pupil Premium*, the *DFE Guide to Effective Use of the Pupil Premium* and *Narrowing the Attainment Gap: A Handbook for Schools* by Daniel Sobel.

Planned Expenditure

Listed below is a breakdown of the measures put in place to support pupils eligible for Pupil Premium funding in this academic year, in line with the priorities outlined above.

A. High quality teaching

B. Academic support in core subjects at Key Stage 3 and 4

Measured using Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores in 2022 GCSE results. Pupil progress will be monitored throughout the academic year through analysis of attainment data.
KS3 pupils eligible for PPG will receive tutoring in core subjects	Support sessions in Maths and English will be delivered by an LSA to small groups of pupils in KS3 who are underachieving in English and Maths.		Pupils will improve their grades in English or Maths after tutoring. The PPG coordinator will analyse data at assessment points for each year group to measure the impact of tutoring.

C. Wider strategies to support access to the curriculum

D. Targeted individual support according to need
